The R600 is meant to compete against the G80. nVidia is releasing the G90 shortly after the R600 is released, then are planning to release G100 in 1Q 2008. nVidia has gone unchallenged for the last 6 months, and not only has it made them hundreds of millions of dollars, but it has put them far, far ahead.

I'm not saying the R600 will be a bad card, but it would simply be illogical to buy it since the card it is competing against will drop drastically in price at the time of its release and be outdated.

Edit: The RV630 is a mid range card, likely to be the X2600. At 125W that means you'll need to connect it to the PSU since the mobo can only supply 75W through the PCIE slot.
