850w psu, by antec. 5200x2 amd, @ stock speeds. 2x2gb kingston ram @800mhz. m2n32-sli deluxe/wifi edition asus mobo.

now the problem is that i can play any non graphycally demanding game for hours, use any applications just fine, dont even need to increase the fan speed from the factory settings of 29%.

once i do start playing games that demand more off the GPU i turn the fan up to 90% and make sure the temps dont go over 60C which im told for video cards is pretty low.

so once i turn on the fan and go to play a game like hellgate london, or guitar hero or crysis. it works for a while anywhere from 30 mins to a couple of hours, and then it freezes the screen.

like for a few seconds i can see a picture of whatever was displayed before (kindof like a really badly taken screenshot) with some discolored pixels in there.

then screen goes black, blue screen of death comes on. with a report saying somethine like; "your system has recovered from serious error" or crash cant remember. then it says something along the lines of "dumping bad memory".

then screen goes completely black untill i hit reset button.

i downloaded the latest available forceware drivers, and now im really out of ideas.

i dont know if bios has anything to do with this or if this is a faulty card.

another random issue i noticed is that it sometimes has fps drops... like in crysis for example. everything is running nice and smooth then all of the sudden its as if i got 10fps or some really low number of frames.

i originally though it was my ram that it was referring to, so i changed the ram to other sticks and it didnt make any difference

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I had a similar situation with my 8600GTS ... (Screen freezes or I get the BSOD, on XP and Vista).. It came down to ordering a new motherboard. My new board, the one now, is XFX Nforce 650I Ultra Conroe and no issues with it on XP and Vista.

I think it also had to do with nVidia drivers, that's where the .dmp files were pointing to. Tried all kinds, but none fixed it (before).

Edit: The old board was not a nVidia chipset either. I believe it was AsRock who made it... (hybrid board)

someone on the nvidia forums suggested that i should underclock it, since it was factory superclocked. i did clock it down from 650/950 to 617/919 and i got to play for over an hour with no problems, and the GPU teps didnt not exceed 65C.

i think what im going to do tonight is clock it back up to factory settings, then play guitar hero since that was the game it crashed the most on.

then i will write down the error number or full description basically some more info.

Sounds like the inside of your case is getting really hot and your processor is getting to a certain temp and shutting down, Try downloading a program called Speedfan (google) and if your PSU is good enough, boost up the rpm on your fans, mainly the fan that blows air out of your case.

btw my temps at the time, CPU @49C, mobo @48C, GPU @59Clf thi is the case, the card is fine and the drivers are the problem. My parent's PC has Windows Vista and it used to do the same thing (although it had Intel GMA 950 or something like that). The thing is, when video drivers crash in XP, it'll BSOD. In Vista, I think they moved the drivers to the user, so if they crash in Vista, they can just restart, thus the alert after they've recovered. Intel has poor drivers for Vista apparently, becuase his kept doing that when he played his basketball game (not graphically demanding at all). I bought him a cheap Saphire Radeon X1550 256MB (and 2GB, since he had only 1GB for Vista) and apparently ATi's Vista drivers are good, becuase he said his game no longer freezes and his PC is quicker.

Point is, that message means it's the drivers, so while you're stuck with the problem, the card is good. Those temperatures are also within spec.

don't really know what i can do now, bought my card about 4 months ago, so i doubt that i can still return it. according to nvidia website there have been no new drivers for this card since December. i see alot of people saying there are some beta drivers out there but i cant find them

i think my next card is going to be ATI since this is getting ridiculous. /bitching

btw the card that i have is EVGA 512-P3-N802-AR GEFORCE 8800GT 512MB DDR3 SUPERCLOCKED PCI-E 2.0 D+D+HD

Remove one DDR2-DIMM as you can't use 4GB fully when using non-64bit XP or non-64bit Vista. It's useless running a 32bit OS with more than 3GB of Ram. Sell the DIMM on Ebay.

Even though Vista recognizes the 4GB Ram it can't deal with them even if your CPU supports PAE (which of course all modern CPUs do) and you have turned Memory remapping on. XP however is limited to ~3,5GB too and doesn't show up 4GB in the system properties tab.

If you are using the manufacturers videocard driver which came with the videocard, get the driver from Nvidia and vice versa.

Be sure that your M2N has a new or at least stable BIOS. The M2N series are well-known for some bugs/issues. Run a stability test for at least 30 minutes. Get Memtest as an ISO, burn and run it.

i am running 64 bit vista so all my ram is showing

i tried using the drivers that came with the card but vista would not let me install them, kept telling me there is something wrong with the drivers or that they were not compatible cant remember exactly what it was. but it would not even let me install the 64 bit vista version of drivers.

i never updated the mobo drivers, so i guess i should start with that. also i tried to stress test the system and it always froze up. ofcours i was using ntune, which even on the nvidia forums i was told is a piece of crap so i am going to try memtest and rivatune this weekend.

however one thing i dont know how to do is flash my bios. as far as i was told i download some iso file and put it on a floppy or burn it on cd, then put it in and reboot? and it should take over from there? or are there some sort of programs that flash bios? also if the latest version of bios make my system unstable is there a way to go back? just take out the battery on the mobo? or insert the cd that came with my mobo?

yeah thats why i never bothered with it... too much can go wrong

I have a 512MB GeForce 8500 GT. I had the BSOD problems with XP about 3-5 minutes into any

3D intensive application, but not with Vista. BSOD was always blaming nv4\_disp.dll. I installed the card on an already installed Windows installation (Vista was installed after the card was). I since have had to reinstall Windows XP (clean install, all formated drives) for something else unrelated and I can now play any 3D intensive game now for hours on end with no problems. I haven't had to replace any hardware at all. I have a TForce4 U775 motherboard which also has the Nvidia chipsets.
