Granted, Flash has a slightly higher learning curve, but once you get going off the curve, you can go so much farther than anything you can do in PowerPoint. I refuse to use PowerPoint anymore. Any time I've got a presentation to make, Flash is the way to go.

Custom animations give any organization a great aire of professionalism which is what attracts people. A good portion of today's at least partially tech-savy population can spot a PP

presentation when they see one. If I saw one at a fast food joint I would think "Gee, look at that cheesy PP presentation. If they're taking the easy way out with their advertising, makes me wonder if the food will be any better." Even people who don't know the difference would probably be more attracted to a flashy, eye-catching animation than some standard PP presentation.

Plus, Flash is a crap-ton more presentable than PowerPoint, seeing as it can be viewed directly as an .swf (if you've got FlashPlayer installed on your computer), exported to a self-contained .exe for viewing, or embedded into webpages. With PowerPoint, you've gotta actually have the creation software (Microsoft PowerPoint itself) installed and running to view the finished product.

On the contrary, a fullscreen Flash is very easily made with simple code (no I don't have it on hand, but it's a common feature, and common ActionScript codes are easily found). You can also set the Flash stage to be as large as you like, I think most monitors generally go up to 1680x1050. I once made a short Flash the size of my desktop res, 1920x1200.

(In Vista open one of the pictures in the folder in preview mode, and click Play Slideshow and it will play a slideshow of all the images in that folder, which can be set to loop and shuffle them. XP should be similar IIRC)
