

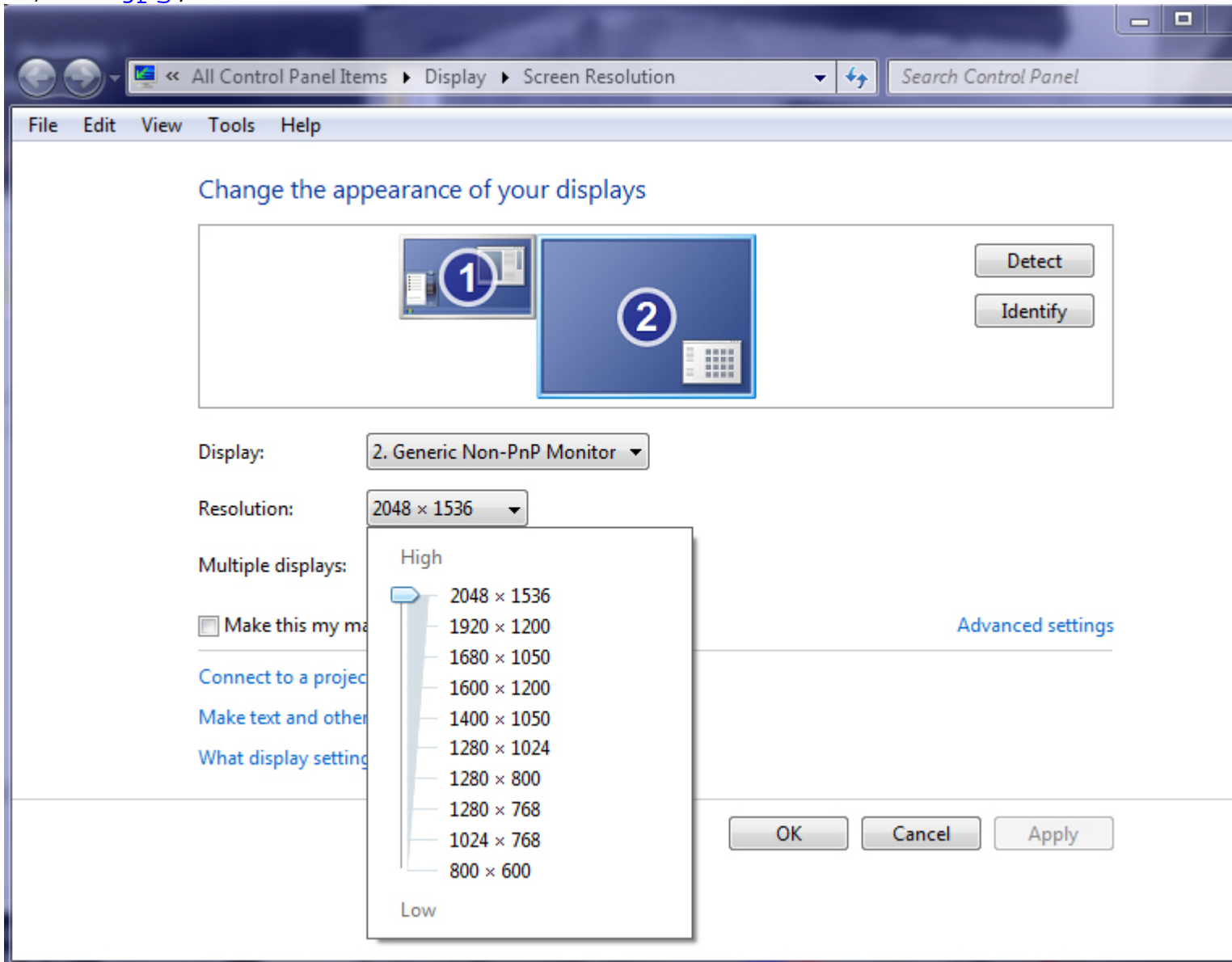
Subject: Secondary Monitor and Vid Card Question
