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Ok, prepare to be confused.

There's two types of i7's: the 9xx Series, and the 8xx series. If you want to use a 9xx, like a i7 920/930, then the motherboard that goes with it is an X58.

i7 8xx CPU's, and i5's, and i3's use the P55/H55 motherboards.

If you just want to play games, then the best CPU is the i5 750. It's very fast, uses less power than the i7 920, and generates way less heat. Good P55 chipsets are cheaper than X58's, and the DDR3 Dual Channel memory for an i5 is cheaper too.

i5's like the 660 are dual cores; they're really fast at stock, and can get huge overlocks.

To answer your question, the i5-750 is faster than the Phenom 955/965. The i5-750 also overlocks much more, if that's something you're interested in. But, if you're just playing games, it's not a big deal.

The Phenom X6 is impressive, but then the 1060T costs more than a i7 920/930. For multithreaded applications, and benchmarks, it's great, but it lags when it comes to gaming compared to the i7 920, and even the Phenom 965. I'm assuming gaming is what SSnipe is after.

I think the money is best spent on a Phenom 955 or i5-750 and then more can be spent on a nice graphics card, or an SSD.

I'm going to automatically assume you want the best performance out of gaming rather than other things, since this is a game forum after all.

Intel's i5 750 seems the most well-rounded, giving decent fps for comparable price to AMD's latest hex-core Phenom II X6 1090T. Also, it uses less power thanks to the 32nm process.

Intel's CPUs offer the best performance per core which makes them run (most) games better, since old games tend to be single-threaded and not many current games (if any) make good use of having many cores, though this may change in the future.

AMD's CPUs offer more cores for a much better price which is good for applications that are heavily threaded, such as encoding multimedia. In the great majority of scenarios though you will rarely use all 6 cores, if you even manage to max out the others. Again, this may change in the future as developers optimize their applications to make use of having more cores.

So in my opinion: Gamers will benefit most from Intel's offerings, while multimedia pros and heavy multi-tasking users will benefit most from AMD's offerings.

This assumes comparable price ranges though. Intel's ultra-high-end-super-expensive CPUs simply beat everything, although the benefits for games is negligible.

As you can see, the game benefits are like I said, negligible, even for this beast of a CPU.

Personally I'd go for the AMD Phenom II X4 965 BE since I'm often encoding multimedia so the extra cores will come in handy.

If I only cared about gaming though, the Intel Core i5 750 wins, however I'd probably go for the AMD Phenom II X2 555 BE since I don't care much about playing on ultra-high resolutions at maxed settings.

Hope my post helps with the decision; I'm an AMD fan but I try to remain unbiased

I got the "bad" C0 stepping which should generally clock less than the much more desired D0 stepping (all current 9xx), but I still have been able to get 4Ghz with HT on. If I would switch HT off then I would probably get 4,1 to 4,3 Ghz on air.

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Just a check on Newegg, and you can get a Phenom 955 with a Gigabyte 770 motherboard for 239 bucks. Comparatively, you can get an i5-750 and a cheap Asus P55 for 298.00.

As someone who has a 955, I've been completely satisfied. Plus, AMD's 'Overdrive' utility is great for easy, automated overclocking for certain programs like GTA4.

But really, if you can swing for the Intel, go for it, because the i5-750 is the best chip in its category. On the other hand, saving 60 bucks could mean the difference between a 5830 and a 5850, or even an SSD.
